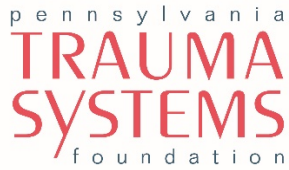
Performance Improvement Tools: Nelson and NFTI
